Pointers This Week:

UW-Stevens Point returns to Salem, Va. to defend its NCAA Division III basketball championship as the Pointers compete in the national semifinals for the second straight year and second time in school history. UW-Stevens Point is attempting to become the first team since UW-Platteville in 1999 to repeat as champion and takes on York in the opening round, while Calvin meets Rochester in the other semifinal on Friday. The championship and third place games are set for Saturday.

Head Coach Jack Bennett:

Jack Bennett carries a 198-56 record in his ninth season with the Pointers and became the school's all-time winningest coach with a 75-52 win over UW-Stout on Dec. 11. His .780 winning percentage ranks second among all active Division III coaches behind Brian VanHaafden of Buena Vista, who has a .794 percentage.

Pointer Update:

UW-Stevens Point advanced to the final four with a pair of sectional victories at the Quandt Fieldhouse over the weekend. The Pointers beat Puget Sound 81-63 in Friday's semifinals and then beat Trinity (Tex.) 61-55 in the title game Saturday.

Nick Bennett scored 22 points in the win over Puget Sound and had 28 points against Trinity to earn sectional MVP honors. Eric Maus added a career-high 18 points in Friday's win and added eight points on Saturday to also earn all-sectional honors. Jason Kalsow earned a spot on the all-tournament team with a pair of solid all-around games, totaling 16 points, seven rebounds and seven assists on Friday and eight points, 10 rebounds and six assists on Saturday.

Scouting the Opponents

York brings a 14-game winning streak into the final four, winning the Mahwah, N.J. sectional with a 70-58 win over King's (Pa.) in the title game. Brandon Bushey was the sectional MVP after scoring 17 second half points while finishing with 21 points in the title game. Bushey leads the team for the season at 16.5 points per game.

The Spartans won their first Capital Athletic Conference title this year and Chad McGowan was named the league's Rookie of the Year. The Spartans average 80.9 points per game and are 15th in the country in three-point field goal percentage at 40.3 percent. York lost in the first round of its only previous NCAA appearance in 1995. The Spartans have had an amazing turnaround after an 11-15 season last year.

Calvin has won two national titles, capturing crowns in 1992 and 2000. The Knights were runner-up in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association, but beat champion Albion on its home floor in the conference tournament final and again in the sectional final to reach its fourth final four.

Dan Aultman, a 6-8 senior forward, scores 16.0 points per game and was named the sectional MVP after scoring 19 points in the title game. Andy Draayer comes off the bench and ranks fifth in the country in three-point shooting at 46.1 percent. The Knights have five players shooting at least 40 percent behind the arc and are fifth in the country as a team at 41.9 percent from three-point range.

Rochester is also making its fourth trip to the final four and won the 1990 national title before finishing runner-up to Calvin in 1992. The Yellowjackets beat Potsdam State in the sectional final and also played in the 2002 final four.

Seth Hauben was the University Athletic Association Player of the Year and also the MVP of the sectional. He scores 19.6 points per game and ranks sixth in the nation in rebounding at 12.3 boards per game. Hauben has 19 double-doubles this season. Senior guard Gabe Perez joined the team nine games into the season and earned first-team All-Conference honors, averaging 9.7 points and 4.9 assists.

Series History

UW-Stevens Point has never played York, nor any opponent from the Capital Athletic Conference.

The Pointers have never faced Rochester in their history.

UW-Stevens Point lost to Calvin 77-62 on Dec. 29, 1969 in the teams' only previous meeting in the first round of the North Park Tournament in Chicago. The Pointers shot 20.5 in the second half and were outscored 50-26 after halftime.

Tournament Notes:

* - The Pointers are 14-3 all-time in five NCAA Division III tournament appearances and have won nine straight games. Their .824 winning percentage ranks second among all Division III schools behind UW-Platteville, which is 30-5 all-time for a .857 winning percentage. The UW-Stevens Point women's basketball team is also 14-3 in tournament play, which is the best in Division III.

* - UW-Stevens Point's three NCAA tournament defeats all came to the eventual national runner-up, losing to Nebraska Wesleyan in 1997 and UW-Eau Claire in 2000 in the Elite Eight and Gustavus Adolphus in the 2003 second round.

* - In addition to its five NCAA appearances, the Pointers played in seven NAIA national tournaments, finishing runner-up in 1984 with current Milwaukee Bucks coach Terry Porter and St. Louis University coach Brad Soderberg in the backcourt. The Pointers lost to Fort Hays State (Kan.) 48-46 in overtime in the title game.

* - Last year's national championship game came victory came exactly 20 years to the day from the Pointers' only previous national title game appearance on March 20, 1984.

* - UW-Stevens Point was a dual member of the NAIA and NCAA for several years before becoming an exclusive NCAA member in 1993-94 and playing in its first NCAA tournament in 1997.

* - UW-Stevens Point is the 11th WIAC team to reach the final four since 1983. The conference has won seven national championships. UW-Platteville won national titles in 1991, 1995, 1998 and 1999 while finishing third in 1992. UW-Whitewater won titles in 1984 and 1989 after a fourth place finish in 1983. UW-Eau Claire was runner-up in 2000 and the Pointers won last year's championship.

* - WIAC teams are 80-26 all-time in NCAA tournament play with eight of the losses coming to other WIAC teams. Including this year's Pointers, of the 26 qualifiers since 1988, 19 have reached the Sweet 16.

* - UW-Stevens Point is attempting to become the third team to win back-to-back national titles. UW-Platteville won in 1998 and 1999 and North Park won three straight from 1978-80.

* - Since 1980 when North Park won its third straight title, UW-Stevens Point is the fifth defending national champion to return to the semifinals. Potsdam State (N.Y.) returned in 1982, UW-Platteville came back in 1992 and 1999 and Williams returned last year. Potsdam State and Williams lost in the title game, while UW-Platteville won in 1999 and placed third in 1992.

* - Last year's tournament MVP Nick Bennett is attempting to become the second player ever to gain two MVP awards. Michael Harper of North Park in 1978-79 is the only previous two-time winner. Bennett is the only player in any NCAA division who earned the outstanding player award as the son of the championship coach.

* - Bennett and Jason Kalsow were both named to the all-tournament team last year and Seth Hauben of Rochester was named to the squad in 2002. There have been seven two-time selections with Michael Crotty of Williams earning the honor the past two years to become the first two-time honoree since 1992.

* - UW-Stevens Point has a common opponent with each team in the semifinals. The Pointers and York both beat Edgewood with UW-Stevens Point winning 79-49 and York winning 80-77. Calvin beat UW-River Falls 62-52, while the Pointers swept the Falcons 65-50 and 94-66. Rochester lost to 72-67 to UW-Superior, which the Pointers beat three times. Rochester also beat Chicago 64-52 and 70-59, while the Pointers defeated the Maroons 70-58.

* - The Pointers are the only sectional host to advance to the final four. In fact, only four hosts in the past three years have qualified.

Team Notes:

* - UW-Stevens Point's 27 victories mark the fourth time the Pointers have reached that mark. Two wins this weekend would match the school record of 29 set last year. UW-Stevens Point was 28-4 in 1983-84 and 27-2 in 1991-92.

* - UW-Stevens Point is 54-1 in its last 55 games against non-WIAC opponents since a loss to Edgewood on Dec. 29, 1999. The Pointers have won 25 straight non-league games since a 75-62 loss to Gustavus Adolphus in the 2003 NCAA second round. The Pointers have won 45 straight regular season non-conference games.

* - The Pointers have been the nation's top-ranked team four different times this year. They were No. 1 in the D3hoops.com pre-season poll and dropped out after each of the three losses only to regain the top spot each time. UW-Stevens Point has been No. 1 in 11 of 15 polls this year and has been in the top 25 for 61 straight weeks.

* - UW-Stevens Point's six seniors have accounted for 73.2 percent of the team's scoring this year. In fact, Jason Kalsow and Nick Bennett alone have combined to score 51.5 percent of the team's points.

* - Over their current nine-game NCAA tournament winning streak, the Pointers are shooting 55.1 percent from the field, 45.8 percent from three-point range and 81.7 percent at the line. They shot just 38.6 percent in their last NCAA tournament loss to Gustavus Adolphus in 2003 and were held below 50 percent for the first time in the past nine NCAA games when they shot 45.1 percent against Trinity.

* - The Pointers are shooting 54.0 percent from the field in their six postseason victories this year, which is remarkably similar to their performance in last year's postseason when they shot 55.7 percent over their nine victories.

* - UW-Stevens Point led the nation in scoring defense for much of the season and ranks second in the country at 56.2 points allowed per game. The Pointers held the nation's sixth-ranked offense from Puget Sound to a season-low 63 points and over 30 points below their average in the sectional semifinal.

* - The Pointers finished 18-0 at home this year and have won 22 straight home games with 10 of the victories coming in the post-season. The total is a single-season school record for home wins and all of the victories were by six points or more.

* - UW-Stevens Point has played only one game all season decided by five points or less and just four games that have been determined by single-digit margins. Their lone close game was a 63-62 overtime win at UW-La Crosse when they trailed by five in the final minute before Nick Bennett and Jason Kalsow each hit three-pointers to pull out the win. They also had six-point wins over Trinity and UW-Oshkosh and an eight-point loss at UW-Whitewater.

* - The Pointers have won nine straight games on neutral courts and 18 of their last 19 neutral court contests. The last defeat was a 60-58 loss to UW-Eau Claire in Storm Lake, Iowa in the 2000 Elite Eight.

* - UW-Stevens Point commits just 15.0 fouls per game and has had only four foul-outs in its 64 games over the past two seasons.

* - UW-Stevens Point averages just 10.4 turnovers per game and has not had more than 15 turnovers in a game this season. The Pointers have an impressive 1.50 assist-turnover ratio this year and had just four turnovers in last year's national title game, including none in the second half.

* - Two wins would give coach Jack Bennett 200 wins for his career. Oddly, UW-Stevens Point women's basketball coach Shirley Egner won her 200th game in the 2002 NCAA title game.

* - The Pointers are shooting 87.9 percent at the free throw line (58-for-66) in the three NCAA tournament games this year. They rank 15th in the country in free throw shooting and Nick Bennett is fifth individually, but has two of the eight misses in the tournament.

* - The Pointers took advantage of a new NCAA rule allowing exhibition games against Division I opponents and lost a hard-fought game to Marquette 78-65 on Nov. 9 in front of 7,957 fans. The Pointers trailed 59-55 with seven minutes left, but Travis Diener scored 32 points to help the Golden Eagles earn the win.

* - UW-Stevens Point played 10 of its last 11 games and all six postseason games at home, drawing 2,303 fans per game over the span. The only road game since January was at the closest conference foe - 73 miles away in Oshkosh. Last season, the Pointers traveled a total of 6,170 miles in a 16-day span during the NCAA tournament.

#10 Tamaris Relerford, 5-8, Sr., Guard, Beloit, Wis.

- * - Started 27 of team's 28 games and played in every game.
- * - Missed second half of NCAA second round victory over Lawrence and is out for the season with a hand injury.
- * - Sectional games were the first games missed of career, having played in all 117 previous games.
- * - Was red-hot from the field over the past nine games, shooting 50.0 percent (15-for-30) from three-point range over the span after shooting 38.0 percent over first 19 games. Shot 50.0 percent (20-for-40) overall from the field over the stretch after shooting 34.4 percent in the first 19 games.
- * - Had a career-high 16 points in win over UW-River Falls on Feb. 16, making five of six three-pointers.
- * - Made 34 of his 41 field goals this season from three-point range. Four of his seven two-point shots came in his last five games.

#10 Tyler Doyle, 6-2, Fr., Guard, Appleton, Wis.

- * - Dressed for nine of the last 11 games in place of Lee or Relerford and played three games, scoring two points against UW-Eau Claire.

#12 Shawn Lee, 5-10, Fr., Guard, Marshfield, Wis.

- * - Missed eight games with a broken hand, but returned to action by playing in all three NCAA tournament games.
- * - Had a season-high seven points in back-to-back wins over UW-Stout and Viterbo.

#20 Brett Hirsch, 6-1, Soph., Guard, Menomonee Falls, Wis.

- * - Has played in 20 games and scored points in 14 of his appearances. Season-high is five points against Wisconsin Lutheran.
- * - Started first 12 games last season, averaging 18.9 minutes per game over first 14 games.
- * - Scored career-high 12 points in first career game vs. Northland.

#22 Brad Kalsow, 6-4, Fr., Guard, Huntley, Ill.

- * - Played in 26 of team's 30 games, including first two games of NCAA tournament.
- * - Scored season-high 12 points while making all four three-point shot attempts in win over Viterbo.
- * - Brother of Pointer forward Jason Kalsow. Scored Huntley high school record 1,819 career points, surpassing Jason's mark.

#24 Steve Hicklin, 6-4, Fr., Guard, Sussex, Wis.

- * - Made first career start in sectional semifinal against Puget Sound and had two turnovers in 37 minutes against full-court pressure.
- * - Has averaged 25.0 minutes in three NCAA tournament games after playing 6.5 minutes per game prior to the tournament.
- * - Has totaled 23 points and eight assists with two turnovers in the NCAA tournament after totaling 40 points and four assists in the 21 games before the tournament. Finished with 15 points against Puget Sound and was 10-for-10 at the free throw line in the sectional.
- * - Began season as third-string point guard and moved into backup role at start of February due to Lee's injury. Earned starts in second half against Lawrence and in sectionals after Relerford's injury.
- * - Redshirted last season.

#25 Kyle Gruszczynski, 6-6, Sr., Guard, Seymour, Wis.

- * - Has played in every game this year, making starts at home against UW-Stout and Wisconsin Lutheran in place of Maus and at UW-La Crosse in place of Relerford.
- * - Had season-high 14 points in start against UW-Stout, hitting four of five three-pointers. Career-high is 19 points as a sophomore at UW-Platteville.
- * - Put team ahead 52-50 on a layup with 2:28 left against Trinity.
- * - Had a career-high seven rebounds in WIAC title game win over UW-Whitewater and played a career-high 28 minutes for the third time this season.
- * - Played freshman season at University of Wisconsin-Madison, appearing in six games for the Badgers.

#32 Cory Krautkramer, 6-5, Soph., Forward, Cameron, Wis.

- * - Played in 19 games as a backup forward, scoring season-high three points at home against UW-Stout.
- * - Notched career-high five points in win over Calumet.

#33 Nick Bennett, 6-5, Sr., Forward, Stevens Point, Wis.

- * - Ranks fourth in school history with 1,612 points, passing Terry Porter on all-time list. Needs 14 points to move into third place and 38 points to move into second place on all-time list behind Jason Kalsow.
- * - School's all-time leader with 224 career three-pointers.
- * - Scored 23 points in NCAA opener against Lawrence, 22 against Puget Sound and 28 against Trinity to earn sectional MVP honors. Averaging 24.4 points while shooting 57.8 percent from the field and 56.1 percent from three-point range in eight career NCAA tournament games. Has averaged 14.0 points over all 115 career games.
- * - Averaging 23.2 points with 20 three-pointers in six postseason games this year.
- * - Earned second straight first-team All-WIAC award, ranking second in scoring behind Jason Kalsow at 18.4 points per game.
- * - Ranks second in WIAC and fifth in nation in free throw shooting at 90.0 percent. Made 24 straight attempts twice this season. Has made 87.4 percent of career free throw attempts.
- * - Needs three three-pointers to tie his own single-season school record of 83 three-pointers set last year.

- * - Has scored double figures in all but one game this year and team is 43-2 over past two years when he scores 14 or more. Only game under 10 points was nine at home against UW-Platteville.

- * - Had season-high 31 points in win over UW-Whitewater on Feb. 9. Scored 28 points in WIAC semifinal win over UW-Oshkosh. Had 27 points and seven three-pointers in exhibition loss at Marquette.
- * - Posted career-high 37 points in 2004 sectional semifinal win over Puget Sound on 13-for-17 shooting.

- * - MVP of 2004 NCAA final four, scoring 30 points in national championship game against Williams. Made 21 of 35 three-point shot attempts during 2004 NCAA tournament for 60.0 percent rate.

#34 Jon Krull, 6-4, Soph., Guard, Marshall, Wis.

- * - Has started all 30 games this season and started 13 of last 14 games as a freshman. Team is 40-3 with him in the starting lineup.
- * - Made 26 of 27 free throws in the seven games prior to the sectional (96.3 percent). Made 65.0 percent at the line (26-for-40) before the stretch and was two-for-five in the sectional.
- * - Scored a total of 36 points in three WIAC tournament games, including season-high 20 in quarterfinal win over UW-Superior. Totaled 13 points in NCAA opener against Lawrence.
- * - Notched career-highs 25 points and eight rebounds in 2004 NCAA semifinal victory over John Carroll.
- * - Scored 2,094 career points in high school, including 36 in 2002 Division 2 state championship game.

#40 Matt Bouche, 6-6, Jr., Forward, Dane, Wis.

- * - Appeared in 18 games as a reserve forward, scoring season-high four points in win over Edgewood.
- * - Totaled career-high numbers with eight points and seven rebounds last season in win over Marian.

#42 Brian Bauer, 6-5, Jr., Forward, Auburndale, Wis.

- * - Played in 29 of team's 30 games and made one start at UW-River Falls. Had season-high 10 points while hitting all five field goal attempts in win over Edgewood.
- * - Made nine straight field goals at one span during mid-season.

 - * - 2004-05 WIAC Player of the Year, becoming fifth player in school history to earn the award. One of 10 finalists for Josten's National Player of the Year award.
 - * - Has started all 119 games of four-year career, setting school record for games played as team is 101-18 during the four years.
 - * - Fourth player in school history to earn All-WIAC honors three straight years.
 - * - Leads WIAC in points at 19.2 per game, assists at 4.4 per game and three-point field goal shooting at 48.1 percent. Ranks third in rebounding at 7.3 per game and is among top 15 in all 12 of league's statistical categories.
 - * - Had a streak of scoring in double figures snapped at 63 straight games with eight points against Trinity. Still finished with 10 rebounds and six assists. Recorded just one career 30-point game with 31 points in win over UW-Eau Claire on Feb. 5.
 - * - Named second-team All-American by NABC in 2003-04. Preseason first-team All-American this year by Street & Smith's.
