On Tuesday, October 16th from 10:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., we will have a Benefits Fair in the Founders Room in Old Main. Representatives from almost all of our providers will be in attendance to address your benefits questions.

Health Plans

Security Health Plan (SHP) continues to be available as a tier 1 plan in 2008; however this year we must utilize Security providers for the preventive dental portion of the plan. They have sent current participants a summary of the changes. The dental benefits with Security Health are found on page G-36 of the "It's Your Choice" book. Members can see a provider of their choice for orthodontic care. Contact SHP for a Schedule of Dental Benefits. Members need to use their SHP ID cards for their dental benefit.

Arise Health is a new tier 1 HMO provider for us; however, it has limited provider availability in Portage County and is considered "non-qualified." Members must select a Primary Care Practitioner for each family member from one of the Primary Care departments (general practice, family practice,

OB/GYN, internal medicine, and pediatrics). The dental benefits with Arise Health are found on page G13 of the "It's Your Choice" book. Dental services provided by a non-Delta Dental premier provider will be limited to the usual & customary rate as determined by Delta Dental. For any coverage questions, please call Delta Dental at 1-800-236-3712. Visit www.WeCareForWisconsin.com to find a network dentist by selecting member, click on Find-A-Doc, select group (State of Wisconsin), and enter group # 087889/

The **Standard Plan** is available at a tier 3. It provides you with freedom of choice among hospitals and physicians in Wisconsin and nationwide. It is administered by WPS Health Insurance – one of the largest health benefits providers in the state.

ERA Accounts

This benefit allows associates to pay for medical and dependent care expenses with pre-tax money. The medical account has a \$7,500.00 limit and the dependent care account has a \$5,000.00 limit per plan year per family. **Current participants must re-enroll to continue participation in 2008.**

Vision and Dental

There is an open enrollment period for both Spectera and Dental Blue. During this time you may switch coverage levels, enroll in the benefit even if you have never been enrolled in the past and waive coverage. If you were in one of these plans previously, coverage will stay in force until you fill out a form to cancel it.

Enjoy the process of choosing the benefits options that will serve you and your family well in 2008. Please bring your list of questions to the Benefits Fair in the Founder's Room on October 16th where your "Benefits Lady" and the plan representatives will make sure that you have all the information you need to select your benefits package with confidence.

Sexual Harassment Training

Sexual harassment is not easily defined and education and training is the best preventive strategy. Education and training will prepare us to deal with the issues involving sexual harassment.

The New Media Learning program is a one-hour long online training module that is designed to help one to better understand the issues surrounding sexual harassment. This program is a convenient and practical means of educating employees and supervisors about sexual harassment and associated legal issues. The session involves hands-on scenarios and asks questions that will help one identify if a particular scenario would or would not be considered sexual harassment. The program also allows for one to complete the training at their own pace. It is not necessary to complete all the sessions in one sitting.

UPDC Grants

The Classified Staff Personnel Development Subcommittee strongly encourages Classified Staff to submit grant requests for training and development projects. The funds administered by the University Personnel Development Committee (UPDC) may be granted to individuals for career development and for some group projects.

Classified employees receiving UPDC grants include:

Development grants support Classified Staff development and training.

Examples of projects that have been funded include: sending a photographer to a seminar on black and white photography, sending clerical employees to a course on developing lead worker skills, and bringing a speaker to campus to conduct seminars on stress reduction.

One copy of your proposal should be submitted to Grant Support Services, Room 204, Old Main, no later than noon on September 21, 2007, February 1, 2008, or March 14, 2008. Funds requested in the September 21 round must be expended before June 30, 2008. Funds requested in the February 1 round must be expended before October 1, 2008. Funds requested in the March 14 round must be expended before January 31, 2009.

Classified Staff may apply for small grants at any time during the academic year until May 1. Activities eligible for this category must cost \$500 or less, and they require at least a \$100 match from the applicant's unit. Requests for more than that amount should be submitted at one of the three regularly scheduled deadlines. One (1) copy of your proposal should be submitted a minimum of three weeks prior to the activity, to Grant Support Services, Room 204, Old Main.
